

Adjective Clauses

An adjective is a word that describes a noun (which is a person, place, or thing) or a pronoun (e.g. she, they). Adjectives come before the words they describe.

e.g. The <u>sick passenger</u> was taken to the infirmary. **adj. noun**

An adjective clause is a group of words that acts like an adjective. Adjective clauses begin with words like *which, that, who, whom, whose, where,* and *when.* Unlike adjectives, adjective clauses come after the words they describe.

e.g. The <u>passenger</u> who was sick was taken to the infirmary.

noun adj. clause

Sometimes these clauses are necessary (restrictive) to the meaning of the sentence, and sometimes they are unnecessary (non-restrictive).

Restrictive Adjective Clauses

- contain defining information about a noun or pronoun
- cannot be deleted from the sentence without changing the basic meaning of the sentence
- sometimes use "that"
- do not require commas
 - e.g. The <u>owl that is most commonly found in the Maritimes</u> is the barred owl. **noun adj. clause**
 - e.g. <u>Students</u> who have spouses have access to family housing services. **noun** adj. clause
- notice that if the above adjective clauses were removed from the sentences, important information about the noun would be missing

Non-Restrictive Adjective Clauses

- contain extra information about a noun or pronoun
- can be deleted without changing the basic meaning of the sentence
- often use "which" instead of "that"
- require commas before and after
 - e.g. The Morelos Dam, which was completed in 1950, diverted most of the Colorado water noun adj. clause crossing into Mexico to the Mexicali valley.
 - e.g. <u>Conrad Bain</u>, <u>who starred on the television show *Diff'rent Strokes*</u>, died at age 89. **noun adj. clause**
